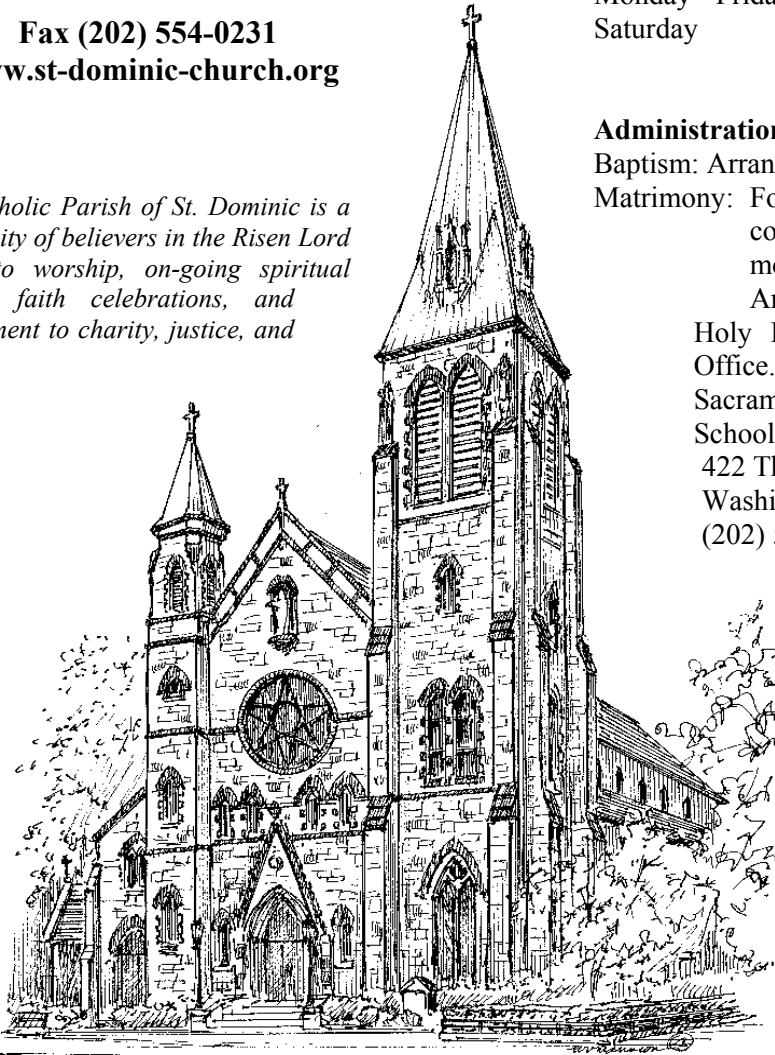

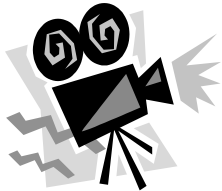

**Comunidad Hispana
Padre Eugenio Cahouet, O.P.**

**Trigésimo segundo Domingo
del Tiempo Ordinario
8 de noviembre de 2009**

Estimada Comunidad Hispana:

La primera lectura nos presenta un pasaje de la historia del profeta Elías. Elías es el modelo del profeta: su símbolo es el fuego, porque su palabra ardía como una llama, puesto que lo devoraba el celo por el Señor. Estos capítulos de los Reyes, constituyen el ciclo de Elías, describen precisamente la lucha entre el paganismo cananeo, el culto de Baal, que contaminaba la religión genuina de Israel.

Es importante relieve especial la figura humilde de aquella viuda de Sarepta sufriendo de hambre y con otra gente también. Elías fue en la misma situación, es decir, POBRE COMO ELLA.

El relato se juega sobre fuertes contrastes: el profeta perseguido por el Ajab el poderoso rey de Israel es salvado por de la muerte por una sencilla viuda. Los dos viven con fe la tragedia de su tiempo.

En paralelo, se nos presenta el evangelio. Hay un juicio contra los escribas incoherentes en su estilo de vida y sus enseñanzas. Son arrogantes y voraces por honor y dinero de las viudas. Una POBRE viuda se presenta y Jesús señala que El agrada la pequeña ofrenda hecha con fe que la ofrenda hecha con muchos aspavientos exteriores. De ese modo, la humildad generosa de la viuda es como el simbol de la verdadera cristiana.

Aun mas: Hay una conexión con la segunda lectura: “Ella ha dado todo lo que tenia para vivir” Eso es la actitud de Jesús en dando su sacrificio en la cruz.

La parte central de los Hebreos (c. 5-10) trata el tema de Jesús Sumo Sacerdote desde el punto de vista sacrificial. El entro en el cielo, que es verdadero tabernáculo de la habitación divina, después de haber derramado su propia sangre para realizar así la salvación del mundo. El “ha dado todo lo que tenia para vivir”.

Ese sacrificio de Cristo, Sumo Sacerdote, es lo que hacemos presente en nuestra Eucaristía. Que El nos transforme y nos haga capaces de entregar aun nuestra propia vida, como El lo hizo.

Elías, la viuda de Sarepta, la viuda del Templo y preeminente, Jesús: cuatro POBRES que dieron todo.
